Solong as some countries believe that they can get the things they lack by making war, real peace will not be created merely by preaching it.

There is wealth enough in the world for all, and Labour believes that by enabling all nations to share that wealth, in peace and on fair terms, the real cause of war will be removed.

So Labour will work to strengthen the League of Nations as an instrument to bring all the peoples of the world together in peace.

But to provide the League with the actual armed power it must have to obtain the respect of the "gangster" dictators, Labour stands for the creation of an International Air Police Force.

This Force, with the threat of its overwhelming power directed entirely to getting a peaceful settlement of disputes, will take away for ever the air terror which hangs over the heads of every peaceful people.

Meanwhile, till permanent peace is secured, a Labour Government will maintain such armed forces as are necessary to defend our country and fulfil our obligations as a member of the British Commonwealth and the League.

The three Services will be linked more closely together, and all jealousies which reduce their effectiveness removed.

By insisting on promotion for merit alone, by improving conditions of living, by removing the great gulf of class-distinction fixed between officers and non-commissioned ranks, Labour in power will improve the efficiency of the man-power.

A Bill will be passed enabling the government to take over all firms manufacturing arms. This will make it possible to stop the arms race being driven forward for the profits of the few.

For Labour's great aim is lasting prosperity based on peaceful progress, not a feverish boom built on preparing for war.



The work at which far the largest number of people in the country are employed, working far the longest hours, is-HOUSEWORK! Labour in power will lighten the lives of the women who run the homes of Britain. They will share the general improvement in wages, and the rest-time of the paid holiday; many of them will be given homes easier to maintain; and in the health and happiness of the children they will have their reward.

The hours and wages of persons employed in domestic service will be brought into line with those of other workers

SINCE 1931 there have never been less than 1,500,000 people unemployed in Britain. That is a shocking fact; and the longer it lasts the more shocking it is. It is shocking not only because the unemployed are not getting the full lives they deserve; but because the whole nation is deprived of the extra wealth they might be creating.

Labour will change all this. Your Britain can and will

Labour will change all this. Your Britain can and will make good use of the power to work of everyone of its citizens. With the goods which they will produce, Britain's wealth will be increased. And in that increase of wealth all Britain's people will share.

To find work for all will take time. But there are certain things which can be done immediately to bring the number of unemployed right down.

Labour in power will make itself responsible for the location of industry. The State must do this, for the sake of the lives of the people. They must not be uprooted and forced to live wherever employers choose to set up their factories.

Labour will see that new industries are brought into the areas where unemployment is most serious. (Labour will not aid only the special areas as at present defined by law, Lancashire in particular also needs help.)

These areas will be revived, and local authorities assisted to reduce the crushing burden of the rates.

This thing can be done, when your Britain is no longer simply a Profiteers' Paradise.





efficiency; Labour in power will expand prosperity and increase employment all over the country.

When the commodity boards become every farmer's chief customer at a guaranteed price for the foods which Britain grows best, employment on the land will stop decreasing and begin to grow again.

Labour in power will begin a controlled programme of public works, helping to make your Britain an even better land to live in. Especially the work of pulling down slums and putting up homes, begun by local authorities, will be planned on a national scale and speeded up.

Besides these measures which will directly create employment, the raising of the school-leaving age at one end, and the provision of a £1 a week pension at sixty-five, conditional on retirement, at the other end, will remove from the labour market people who should not be on it.

In conjunction with the Trade Unions a drive will be made for better wages and working conditions in all trades.

Shorter working hours will be introduced by law, taking a forty-hour week as standard.

A new Workmen's Compensation Bill will be passed.


For those who remain for a time unemployed, the Family Means Test will be abolished, and the last taint of charity removed from maintenance.

Labour intends to make every man and woman in Britain, once and for all, safe from any fear of loss of livelihood. So long as that fear remains, the people of Britain are not free.

LABOUR PUTS HUMAN



Every Man and Woman will be able to retire from work and enjoy old age in comfort

HE present State Pension of 10/- a week at sixty-five is not enough. Too often it does not ensure retirement to the pensioner but simply leads to a reduction in wages—and that keeps a younger man or woman out of a job.

Labour in power will immediately increase the present Pension to £1 a week and make it conditional on retirement from all except sparetime work with earnings up to about £1 a week. Married couples, where the husband is sixty-five or over, and the wife fifty-five or over, will receive 35/- a week.

It will also be made possible for people covered by the plan to increase their pensions and to secure payments before sixty-five if they desire, by making additional contributions. This new method of saving will give better value for money than any existing form of insurance.

All people of sixty and over who have been out of work for some time and are receiving

Unemployment Assistance—if the Unemployment Assistance Board certifies that they are not likely to get work again—will receive the same pension as if they were sixty-five.

The widows of insured men will be assisted in giving their young families a better start in life; the weekly allowances for their children will be increased from 5/- to 7/6 for the first child, and from 3/- to 5/- for each other child. Orphans' allowances will also be increased from 7/6 to 10/- a week.

Widows whose husbands died before 1925, and who now lose their pension when all their children have left school, will not be deprived of their pension under the Labour plan.

The retirement of older persons on these improved pensions will create employment for some 300,000 younger people under pension age.


There will also be a steady flow of increased purchasing power due to the larger pensions to be given to the 3,000,000 old people benefiting under the existing scheme.


Labour's Pension Plan will mean that the vast majority of men and women in your Britain will be assured of a reasonably comfortable retirement.

OAL prices are too high; many homes have to go cold for part of every winter week: yet the miner risks his life for a sweated wage.

Gas and electricity supply rates vary greatly from district to district; in many districts they are much too high, so that cooking and hot water become expensive luxuries.

The extraction of oil and other by-products from coal has been largely neglected, although Britain has so much coal of her own, but no oil.


All these industries cry out for complete public ownership and sound national control; and Labour in power will see that the public which pays for them, owns them. Muddles and inefficiencies will be straightened out; prices will be brought down to the lowest possible level.

Increased prosperity and greater efficiency will make it possible to pay decent wages to the miners and all the other workers in these industries.

Water supply is at present largely owned and run by local authorities, but experts have agreed that a national scheme of control is needed.

Instead of leaving them in the hands of private ownership, greedy for profit, Labour in power will run these public services with real efficiency for the benefit of all, as the Post Office is now run.

OF PUBLIC SERVICES

OMPETITION between the four great railway companies does not make for efficiency; they should be combined into one, just as the numerous companies were welded into the "Big Four" in 1921.

The railways are fighting a continuous battle with road transport. The roads are dangerous, often from overcrowding.

The canals, many of them owned by the railways, have largely gone out of use; yet for certain kinds of goods they are the most satisfactory method of transport.

Coastwise shipping is declining fast; harbour dues vary greatly according to the ownership of the harbour.

Air transport, though supervised by the Air Ministry, needs better co-ordination with land travel.


Labour in power will set up a National Transport Board to bring all forms of transport into a sound, working scheme together. The Board will have power to purchase, own and operate the railways and such other transport services as are suitable for public ownership.

Labour, in power, will be able by means of this Board to give the public a safe, cheap and efficient transport system and, in co-operation with the Trade Unions, to see that the workers in the transport industries get fair wages and conditions.

We Can Win Them Only

HIS Magazine shows what Labour's Immediate Programme means to Britain. It sets forth the benefits which a Labour Government will bring to the people in its first full term of Parliamentary power.

We are all very proud that Britain is a democratic country and wish to keep it so. Democracy means "Government of the people, by the people, for the people."

Yet most British people know that a quarter of all the children in the country never get enough food, that over a million and a half are out of work, and that millions live in housing conditions not good enough for animals.

Is it the will of the people that things should stay like this? It cannot be so. Yet millions who have a vote do not use it—(nearly a third of the whole electorate at the last General Election). Millions of others vote carelessly, without considering the present condition of Britain, and how it can be improved.

Many of these people do not believe their votes will do any good. They don't believe any government will ever do anything really big to put things right.

This magazine shows that they are wrong. The Labour Party is definitely pledged to this Immediate Programme, which is the beginning of Socialism. Full plans for carrying it out have been made, and can be put into operation immediately.

But to make lives of the people better and happier, the common life of the whole people must be planned with

To do this, a Labour Government must give the nation charge of the machinery of finance. Firstly, the Bank of England will be taken over for the nation—in fact, those

words " of England" will be made to mean something. The chief function of the Bank of England is to control "credit." Through the Joint Stock Banks it has a general influence on the financing of all Britain's industries; its actions have an immediate effect on employment and trade.

That is surely not a power to be held in private hands. Labour will see that the Bank of England is controlled by experienced men whose aim is national service, not private profit, under the general direction of the Government.

Labour in power will set up a National Investment Board to control the disposal of new capital, to make sure that it is not lost in short-lived speculative schemes, but well invested in sound industries that will create employment and increase our country's wealth.

Labour will not confiscate property, nor destroy the value of existing investments.

Fair compensation will be paid to property owners and the shareholders of any industry which is taken over for the common good. Whenever possible this compensation will take the form of Government bonds in the property or industry taken over.

The ordinary man and woman's property and savings will actually be much safer under a Labour Government working for the common wealth of all, than under a "National" Conservative Government influenced by sectional interests.

When your Government controls credit and investment it will be possible to ensure that we have no more booms and slumps caused by rich men gambling in the necessities of life, but a uniform prosperity which will bring security and a decent standard of life to all.

Do not forget that Labour has never yet been in Parliamentary power.
