Sources For Co-operative History in the United Kingdom

This guide is to help reserchers to find material relating to the co-operative movement across UK archives and museums. It is not an exhaustive survey of resources for co-operative history but an overview of key collections held at institutions that are members of SSLH ARC. Because most co-operative societies have close links with their local communities, it is possible to find records of some co-operative societies in local authority archives. Researchers should also check The National Archives Discovery catalogue for locating archives held at other repositories.

The co-operative movement's proud claim to look after its members from the cradle to the grave is reflected in the materials held by the Archive. The Co-op Archive was established after the bringing together of collections formerly held by the Co-operative Union and the Co-operative College. This has enabled the development of a resource allowing researchers to consult material from the early nineteenth century to the present day in a single Archive – from Robert Owen through the Christian Socialists and the formation of national and international organisations to modern successful co-operative businesses of the twenty first century. There are many links with Labour Movements especially with Trade Union material and the Co-op Party Collection. Information about the collections can be found on the Search The Archives and subject guides pages on the website.

Books & Journals

Historical and current books on various aspects of the co-operative movement. Links to printed material (such as society histories and periodicals) is currently being updated and links will be added to the website when complete.

British Co-operative Societies – Facts & Figures

An extensive collection of published histories and journals of individual consumer and productive societies. Statistical information dating from the 1870s. Registrar's Reports, Co-operative Union Directories, Co-operative Congress Proceedings, and Co-operative Statistics.

Records of Co-operative Societies and Organisations

Minute books, reports and original documents of societies which now form part of the Midlands Co-operative Society and the Northern, South

Midlands and South East Regions of the Co-operative Group dating from the mid 19th century.

Minute books and other documents relating to the Co-operative Press, the National Co-operative Fuel Managers Association and the Southern Co-operative Convalescent Association.

Minute books, publications and reports relating to co-operative auxiliaries such as the Co-operative Women's Guild, Co-operative Men's Guilds, National Guild of Co-operators, co-operative youth movements.

The Co-operative Party collection including reports, journals and pamphlets.

International Co-operative Movement

Books, pamphlets and journals relating to the International Co-operative Alliance (ICA), including a complete set of ICA Congress Reports.

Historical Journals

The Collection includes runs of journals from the early 19th century, including King's Co-operator, New Moral World, Pitman's Co-operator, Co-operative News and Scottish Co-operative News.

Film, Oral History & Photographic Collection

Collections include the National Co-operative Film Archive, the National Oral History Archive, the Co-operative Press Photographic Collection and other photographs.

Correspondence Collections

Robert Owen social reformer, philanthropist and co-operator. Books and pamphlets by and about Owen and his work. More than 3,000 original letters and documents.

George Jacob Holyoake co-operative leader, secularist and social reformer. Books and pamphlets by and about Holyoake and his work. More than 3,500 original letters and documents.

Edward Owen Greening pioneer of co-operative co-partnership societies and a founder of the International Co-operative Alliance. Books and

pamphlets by and about Greening and his work. Approximately 11,000 original letters and documents.

The People's History Museum holds a significant collection of approximately 2000 artefacts representing the Co-operative Group, the world's largest consumer co-operative representing a wide range of products, packaging, advertising and administrative ephemera serve to illustrate the many facets of 'co-op' activities, together with several reference books. Enquiries about and research requests regarding 'co-op' collections are welcomed and a selection of artefacts and images may be accessed via the museum's website phm.org.uk by using the Search Our Collections option and entering the term co-operative in the search box.

These collections demonstrate how the 'co-op' offered 'cradle to grave' opportunities for many working people; highlights include commemorative tins from 'co-op' factories, shoes and clothing, sets of crockery, dividend tokens, advertising signs, tins and packets of food and household goods, an early 'wind-up' record player, playing cards, toys and jig-saws.

Archival Material

The Labour Party Archive includes numerous files on the co-operative movement with references to the Co-operative Printing Society Ltd, the Co-operative Union Ltd, the Co-operative Properties Ltd, the Amalgamated Society of Co-operative Employees and the Co-operative Union Southern Section, 1900-1907. There are files in the War Emergency Workers National Committee files and in the General Secretary's Papers.

The JS Middleton papers include files on the Woodcraft Folk and Socialist Sunday Schools (1926-38, LP/JSM/SU) and the Labour Party General Secretary's papers also include a file on the Woodcraft Folk. The Archive of the Communist Party of Great Britain holds material on the Co-operative Movement including a file on the Woodcraft Folk (1948-1950, LP/GS/WOOD).

The Archive of the Communist Party of Great Britain holds material on the Co-operative Movement including a file on the Woodcraft Folk and the British Federation of Young Co-operators, 1952-58 and notes by Bill Alexander and documents on co-operatives 1962, CP/CENT/ PC/06/10.

The Labour History Archive and Study Centre (LHASC) also holds the minutes of the National Council of Labour 1921-56. Members of this council included representatives from the co-operative movement.

Published Material

The Labour History Archive and Study Centre holds 337 pamphlets on the Co-operative Movement, classified under Co-operatives, 334. These are divided up under 334. I Owenism; 334.2 Co-operative Movement, 334.2 I Co-operative Party, 334.2 I Co-operative Societies, 334.23 Workers' Co-operatives; 334.3 Common Ownership; 334.4 Co-Partnership.

LHASC also holds annual reports of the Co-operative Wholesale Society 1884-1918 and the Co-operative Union 1906-76, as well as the annual editions of the People's Year Book 1919-50.

The Working Class Movement Library is a national collection of the history of British and Irish radical and labour movements from the late 18th century up to the present day. It includes books, pamphlets, leaflets, banners, pottery, prints, photographs, personal papers, posters, videos, trade union records and much else that documents and illuminates the story of working class struggles for social justice, democracy and equality. The Library is open to everyone to visit by appointment between 10am and 4pm Tuesday to Friday, and the catalogue is available online at www.wcml.org.uk/catalogue - although not all material has yet been catalogued, this is often a useful first port of call.

The Working Class Movement Library holds a large collection of cooperative movement material including books, congress reports and journals, much of which was collected by founders Ruth and Eddie Frow.

The pamphlet and archive collections have boxes dedicated to the Cooperative Union, both the Co-operative Women's and Men's Guilds, a variety of Co-operative Societies and the Co-operative Party plus a collection of co-operative movement periodicals.

The library also holds the collection of Bill Whittaker, a Communist Party activist from Burnley, which contains material relating to the co-operative movement and local co-operative societies.

The collection also contains a large amount of ephemera, such as badges, posters, plates, mugs, other ceramic items, handkerchiefs and framed items.

The John Rylands Library was founded in 1889 by Enriqueta Rylands in memory of her husband John Rylands. The library became part of The University of Manchester in 1972 and currently holds the Special Collections of The University of Manchester Library. You can search our digital repository and access online versions of key items in our Library collections via Library Digitised Collections: https://luna.manchester.ac.uk/luna/servlet/allCollections

The John Rylands Library has strengths in the history of the labour movement. Key highlights include extensive collections on the Peterloo Massacre and its aftermath, The Manchester Guardian archive, especially the CP Scott editorial correspondence and the Women's Suffrage movement archives. The library also holds an important collection of the first Labour Prime Minister, Ramsay MacDonald (1866-1937) along with the papers of other politicians and political activists including Mabel Tylecote (1896-1987), active in local politics and adult education, David Arnold Wilson (1897-1981), a Yorkshire railway clerk and trade unionist and John Turner Walton Newbold (1888–1943), socialist and historian. The Library holds a small amount of material relating to Margaret Collins (1907-1999) whose 1937 diaries document a visit to the Soviet Union. Collins educated herself through the Woman's Cooperative Guild and won a Mary MacArthur scholarship to Ruskin College Oxford.

The John Rylands Library also holds general books and pamphlets ranging from the unstamped press, Chartism, the suffrage movement, the cooperative movement, printed material on Robert Owen and Holyoake and some co-operative periodicals such as 'Wheatsheaf'.

The Ahmed Iqbal Ullah RACE Centre holds unique collections related to diaspora communities in Manchester and to race relations in the UK from the 20th century onwards. This includes the papers from the Abasindi Cooperative – an organisation based in Moss Side, established by and to benefit the black women in the community.

The **London Co-operative Society** was established in 1920 through the merger of the Stratford and Edmonton Co-operative Societies; other co-operative societies based in the Greater London area later joined them. The Society was amalgamated with the Co-operative Retail Society in 1981. The archive donated to the Bishopsgate Institute in the late 1970s, consists of the minute books, reports and papers of the London Co-operative Society and its founding bodies, as well as the societies and branches from the Greater London area that merged with them. It includes pamphlets, journals and monographs relating to all aspects of Cooperation in Great Britain from c.1830-1980s and the histories of various regional co-operative societies, plus reports and speeches from the annual Co-operative Congress from 1869 to 1990, publications produced for the education of Society members, rule books and a great variety of advertising leaflets. It includes correspondence, ledgers relating to deliveries, share ledgers, pamphlets, photographs and a large number of volumes relating to the history of the co-operative movement. The collection includes material relating to the following organisations:

NORTH EAST WALES ARCHIVES (NEWA)

In 2020, Flintshire Record Office and Denbighshire Archives Service became the joint service NEWA which represent a new joint service for the counties of and Flintshire and Denbighshire. Some records are held at Ruthin and others at Hawarden, as noted below.

The Ruthin branch holds a wealth of material on the co-operative movement in North East Wales. In 1890 and 1891 a series of public meetings were held in Flint, Mold and Wrexham and these provided a catalyst for the development of the 'Co-op' in North East Wales which between 1888 and the 1930s spread throughout the industrial areas of Wrexham, Mold and Deeside with the opening of many branches and shops. The records indicate a close connection between the 'Co-op' and local industries in the Wrexham coalfield area.

It also holds material illustrating the pioneering work of Thomas Charles (1839-1912) of Brymbo, at various dates, secretary and chair of Brymbo Industrial Temperance Co-operative Society (from the 1870s); later, first chair (in 1888) of the Cheshire and North Wales District Co-operative Association and Board member of the Central Co-operative Union in Manchester.

The author of these articles searched sources at the Co-operative Union Library in Manchester and obtained official lists of North Wales co-operatives (with covering dates) from the member relations officers of the Co-operative Retail Services at Swansea and Llandudno Junction. He also

obtained information from people, who had worked for the 'Co-op' locally for many years. He also made copies of items held elsewhere and these copies are available in the Denbighshire Record Office, Ruthin: references NTD 1229, NTD 1243, NTD 1244, NTD 1275, NTD 1276.

Major collections

Co-operative Productive Federation [DCF]

The Federation was formed in 1882 to join together some fifteen local producer-owned co-operative societies, with the aim of helping them to find capital and markets for their goods. These members were involved mainly in the clothing, footwear and printing trades, operating on a copartnership and profit-sharing basis. The Federation was overtaken by the establishment in 1971 of the Industrial Common Ownership Movement as the central organisation of a new generation of workers' co-operatives. The records held cover the period between 1896 and 1968. For the CPF itself, they comprise general minute books, to 1961, minutes of the propaganda committee (1915-1919), the footwear commodity committee (1943-1962) and the Stanton Memorial Scholarship committee (1918-1948), volumes of press cuttings (1938-1968), a visitors' book (1947-1952), a cash book (1895-1899) and a ledger (1918-1920). There are also minute books for the following related bodies: the Co-operative Co-partnership propaganda committee (1918-1960), the management committee and advisory subcommittee of Co-operative Productive Federation Footwear Ltd (1946-1954), and the Lancashire and Yorkshire Centre of the Labour Association for the Promotion of Co-operative Production based on Labour Copartnership (1897-1899).

Co-operative Women's Guild [DCW]

Following the inclusion of the first women's page in *Co-operative News* in early 1883, the Women's League for the Spread of Co-operation was formed. The League promoted the principles of co-operation and campaigned to improve the political, social and legal conditions of women. It worked particularly in the field of women's health, and tried to balance

both domestic and wider feminist concerns. In 1885 the organisation changed its name to the Women's Co-operative Guild and under the influence of its secretary, Margaret Llewellyn Davies, membership grew rapidly from 51 branches and 1700 members in 1889 to a peak of 1500 branches and 72,000 members in 1933. In 1963 it was re-named the Co-operative Women's Guild. Its success led to the formation of the International Co-operative Women's Guild.

The archives held by the Library are substantial and cover 1886 to 1971. There are minutes of the Central Committee (1888-1970), Annual Congress (1956-61), Southern Section (1903-09), South Eastern Section (1919-50), meetings of Sectional Secretaries (1938-66) and Joint Sub-Committee of the Men's and Women's Co-operative Guilds (1913-16). Other material includes annual reports (1893-1970, with gaps), handbooks, resolutions and amendments for Annual Congress (1894-1971, with gaps), and Guild rules. Notes for speakers are available on topics as diverse as social security, town planning, housing, health, peace, human rights, divorce, and aspects of the co-operative movement, covering mainly the 1940s and 1950s. Photographs in the collection include Annual Congresses, National Presidents, Central Committee members, staff, delegations, demonstrations and knitting contests. Published material by and about the Guild includes The Women's Co-operative Guild, 1883-1904 by Margaret Llewellyn Davies and the typescript of Mrs Ganley's history covering 1925 to 1957. There is a range of pamphlets, reports and articles, and files on subjects such as plays and pageants, the Scottish Co-operative Women's Guild, food and clothing parcels to Germany and Austria (1946-48) and policy statements. Pamphlets can also be found outside the main archive at DX/148/1 and DDX/16/383.

An attendance and contributions book for 1941-68 and the Committee minute book for 1948-51 for Hull Central Branch of the Guild are also held at DP/161/56-57.

Hull and East Riding Co-operative Society [DHC]

This collection comprises the records of the principal co-operative society in the region from its establishment in 1890 until its transfer into Co-operative Retail Services in 1981. The collection includes Management Committee minute books for various periods between 1890 and 1966, and thereafter minute books of the Board of Directors to 1979, members' meetings minute books, rules, handbooks, registers of officers, sub-

committee minute books (finance, drapery, grocery, bakery, coal, stables, farm, etc), quarterly, half-yearly and annual reports and statements of accounts, purchase account books, and employee welfare records. There are also minutes of the Beverley and District Co-operative Society Ltd. and of its Education Department, the Market Weighton and District Co-operative Society, Hull Cooperative Chemists Ltd and the Skyline Restaurant and Catering Company. The earliest records are balance sheets of the Hull Co-operative Provident Co Ltd, for 1858-1867. There is a set of several hundred photographs of subjects such as cakes, exhibitions, groups of staff, individual portraits, premises, shop windows, vehicles, war damage (Second World War) and workshops, mainly from the 1930s and 1940s. Miscellaneous items include some early 20th century anti-co-operative posters issued by William Cussons of Hull, a 3 page history of the Co-operative Society in Bridlington, and a letter and two postcards from George Jacob Holyoake.

Hull Printers [DHP]

This firm was established on co-operative and co-partnership principles in 1897 by a group determined to give workers good conditions and fair rewards. This involved worker participation in ownership and management. Its most successful period was in the 1950s, when over 80 people were employed. Beset by problems including lack of capital, rapid technological change and, ironically, serious labour difficulties, the firm went into liquidation in 1975. The records cover the 1897-1975 period. There are minute books of the Board of Management (containing reports and balance sheets), accounts (including nominal, sales and purchase ledgers, cash books and day books), contracts, files (relating to agreements, contracts, wages, staff etc.), share registers and registers of members, and miscellaneous items, including some examples of the firm's work, and anniversary histories of the firm issued in 1922 and 1937.

International Co-operative Women's Guild [DCX]

The success of the Co-operative Women's Guild in Britain prompted the establishment of similar bodies in many other countries, followed by the ICWG itself in 1922, composed of representatives from each of the national guilds. Its first President was Emmy Freundlich, an Austrian Member of Parliament. The ICWG later became the Women's Committee of the International Co-operative Alliance. The majority of its archives are held in Vienna. This small collection includes minutes of the Central and

Executive Committees (1932-62, with gaps), files on annual conferences, including the first held in Basle in 1921, reports (1921-59), circular letters and information bulletins. Printed material mainly dates from the 1920s to the 1940s and includes examples by Margaret Llewellyn Davies, A Honora Enfield and Emmy Freundlich. There are also significant files on the imprisonment of Emmy Freundlich in Vienna in 1934 and the campaign for her release, and on the ICWG's work for peace and disarmament in collaboration with the League of Nations. The archives are in English, French and German.

Youth Movement Archive/Woodcraft Folk 1910-1985

The Woodcraft Folk broke away from its parent body, the Kibbo Kift to found an independent organisation in 1925. The original leading members came from South London co-operative groups who withdrew from the Kibbo Kift Kindred in 1924. Although they continued with the same

principles of woodcraft training, they were strongly committed to the democratic principle within the movement and had an international outlook. They were closely associated with the co-operative movement and a member of the International Falcon Movement and the Socialist Educational International. The Woodcraft Folk continues to work with young people throughout the UK.

The papers of the Woodcraft Folk, 1910-1985, include yearbooks and annual reports, 1928-1973; administrative material, 1930-1972, notably agenda and minutes of National Delegate Conferences, the National Folk Council and its various committees, membership details, and financial papers such as account books, paysheets and correspondence; general correspondence, 1929-1972, on subjects including the Public Order Act, Folk organisation during World War Two, conscientious objection, and the organisation of campsites; material concerning teaching undertaken by the Folk, 1938-1956, notably papers concerning National Training Camps, tests and badges; correspondence and papers concerning the National Folkhouse, 1938-1958; publications and propaganda, [1926-1965], also including song sheets, play scripts, draft articles and newspaper cuttings; correspondence and papers concerning relations with other organisations, 1929-1972, notably the Co-operative Union; material relating to international activities, 1931-1975, including correspondence with international youth groups, participation in international children's camps and European conferences; papers relating to local Woodcraft Folk groups, 1924-1973; papers of individual Folk, [1925-1975]; photographs of Folk activities, 1938-1971; printed materials and periodicals, 1910-1973.

Oram; Albert Edward (1913-1999); Baron Oram; Politician: 1960-1990

Albert Edward Oram, 1913-1999, was educated at Brighton Grammar School and the University of London (London School of Economics and Institute of Education). He became a teacher, but left the profession to become a research officer for the Co-operative Party, 1946-1955. He was a Labour and Co-operative Party MP for East Ham South from 1955 to 1974, Parliamentary Secretary, 1964-1969, and a Government Whip, 1976-1978. He was greatly interested in aiding development throughout the world and was a member of the Commonwealth Development Corp, 1975-1976, co-ordinator

of the development programmes of the Co-operative Alliance, 1971-1973 and Chairman of the Co-operative Development Agency 1978-1981. Papers relating to the co-operative movement, UK affairs, overseas aid and development, foreign affairs, and Oram's speeches and articles.

Crosland/14 Co-operative Independent Commission 1956-1958

The Co-operative Independent Commission was set up in 1955, by the Edinburgh Co-operative Congress. Hugh Gaitskell was chairman and Tony Crosland, secretary. The Commission was charged with investigating the future of co-operative societies in the light of changes in the UK retail industry. The Commissioner held 35 meetings over 3 years and also made a number of visits. The final report made 51 recommendations. However few changes were made to co-operative societies system until the mid 1960s.

Contents include reports on visits (VIS/CARC/1-22) and Commissioners papers (COM/CARC/1-22), cuttings and press comments.

The TUC Library Collections, established in 1922, transferred to the University of North London, now London Metropolitan University, in September 1996. The core areas of the collection are reference and historical works on the trade union movement, union publications from the UK and overseas, documents relating to working conditions and industrial relations in various industries, and material collected from the various campaigns and policy areas in which the TUC has been involved since its foundation in 1868. A major strength of the Library are the large holdings of pamphlets, periodicals and other ephemera dating from the 1900s onwards, although some earlier pamphlets date back to the 19th century.

The collection on the co-operative movement comprises 8 metres of books, periodicals and pamphlets, dating (with a few exceptions) from 1900 onwards. The collection includes publications from institutions such as the Co-operative Union, Party, Wholesale Society; other co-operative groupings such as the Women's Co-operative Guild; and runs of key serials including *The Co-operative Congress reports, Co-operators Yearbook, The Link, The Producer, Tradition.* The collection is particularly strong on links between the co-operative and trade union movement, for example the United Advisory Council of Trade Unionists and Co-operators, and material about co-operative employees with publications from the Amalgamated Union of Co-operative Employees, National Association of Co-operative Officials and USDAW (and its predecessors). There is also a small international section, including documents from the International Co-operative Alliance from 1895. Heritage Quay is the special collections, archives, and records management service at the University of Huddersfield.

Political collections include the **G.H.Wood Collection** which comprises of around 50,000 pamphlets, spanning roughly 1870-1930. It was the personal library of George Henry Wood, a statistician and socialist who spent much of his career striving to improve the living and working conditions of the lower classes. Wood loaned the collection to the Huddersfield Technical College in 1925 and 20 years later, upon his death, it was gifted to form a part of what would later become the University library. is an important source for industrial history and includes material on the co-operative movement.

The Garth Pratt Co-operative Society library is a library concerning cooperativism, cooperative studies and the Fabian Society, including Co-operative Union Annual Congress Reports.

Material relating to the history of co-operative ideas and the co-operative movement is included in the following collections:

Goldsmiths' Library of Economic Literature

This collection of around 70,000 items published from the 16th through to the early 20th century includes holdings of 19th century material relevant to co-operative history. Early editions of works by Robert Owen, theoretical works by other authors and publications of various branches of the movement are held. For example there are publications produced by the first two meetings of the Co-operative Congress in 1831, in Manchester and Birmingham and early journals such as *The Co-operator* published in

Brighton from 1828-30 and *The Co-operative Magazine and Monthly Herald*, 1826-30, published in London. The collection also includes archive material.

Family Welfare Association Library

This collection complements the Goldsmiths' Library, and has material relevant to co-operative history, but generally from the later 19th and early 20th century. Some archival material is included.

John Burns Collection

A number of publications relevant to co-operative history are to be found in this collection. The pamphlets are mostly catalogued, and work is in progress on books and journals as of December 2004.

Ron Heisler Collection

This is a newly donated collection with around 18,000 books, 3,000 periodical and newspaper titles and 19,000 pamphlets. Cataloguing is to begin in 2005, and early surveys indicate that this collection, which comprises material published by or relating to labour and radical political movements and political expression in art, drama and literature, includes some holdings relevant to co-operative history.

NLW has extensive holdings of the Wheatsheaf journal and Co-operative Home Magazine - issued by the Co-operative Wholesale Society. The Wheatsheaf and Co-operative Home Magazine also carried inserts from individual co-operative societies (each society would, typically, have had its own 4-8 page insert, with local society news, monthly over decades) NLW has examples, such as Abergavenny Society, May 1934 – many years; Cwmbwrla, various 1903-5; Swansea, various, 1906-8; Tredegar,

probably late 1914/early 1915. There was also a South Wales Supplement inset to Wheatsheaf/CHM from the 1920s to the late 1950s. most of which are held by NLW, although the South Wales Supplement is not listed in the NLW catalogue.
